First, please join me in congratulating Fire Service program instructors Chief Adam Cabeza and Chief Brian Wiwel for being granted tenure at yesterday's Board of Trustees meeting!

In less than two months, on April 19-21, the college will host a team of peer reviewers from our accrediting body, the Northwest Commission on Colleges and Universities (NWCCU). As you know, accreditation is about the continuous improvement of the college and its processes that support students in achieving their educational goals. Moving through this 7-year reaccreditation cycle is an opportunity to help the college thoroughly evaluate our programs and services.

To help prepare for this important visit, faculty, staff and students are invited to **mock forums on Tuesday, March 7.** Details are in the accreditation update below. I encourage you to participate in the forums so you can learn more about the peer review process and evaluation in April.

Department Updates

Instruction

The Office of Instruction submitted a Statement of Need to the State Board for Community and Technical Colleges (SBCTC) proposing a Bachelor of Applied Science (BAS) degree program in Public Safety Administration. If approved, this will be the first BAS degree for Bates Technical College!

Open Houses

Kudos to Aja Cheslik for coordinating the Allied Health Program Open House on February 9, where faculty and representatives from various departments including Financial Aid, Advising, Retention Specialists, and Disability Support Services met with new and prospective students. Faculty librarian Mike Wood had a fantastic display that demonstrated Visible Body 3D anatomy software.

The EMT and Fire Service Open House took place on February 16 at South Campus to allow prospective students an opportunity to explore associate degree and firefighter career possibilities.

Technical High School

The Federal Way School District visited Bates Technical College as their first in-person field trip last month. Over 60 high school students toured the Fire Service, Architectural Woodworking/Cabinetmaking, Early Child Education, Auto Body and Welding programs.







Transitional Education

Bates Transitional Studies Department completed the four-year program evaluation process with SBCTC Basic Education for Adults (BEdA). From the exit interview, the SBCTC BEdA team shared that "Bates is a role model with supporting basic skills students by achieving the number one student measurement skills gains in the State of Washington."

Administrative Services

Childcare Center Update

Eastside Center – Our eastside location (at Bethlehem Baptist Church) experienced a ceiling leak requiring the temporary closure of the site. The program supports 20 children through an ECEAP grant through the Puget Sound ESD. The program will temporarily be relocated to Building C at the Downtown Campus.

Capital Projects Update

Fire Service Training Center – Work is underway to obtain approval from the State Board and the Office of Financial Management for revisions to the proposals predesign the Fire Service program training facility. The revision is to locate the building on the site of the current CDL program at the north end of South Campus. In March/April, the college will work with the Department of Enterprise Services (DES) to develop and advertise a two-part RFQ/RFP for use in identifying and selecting a progressive design-build team to execute the project.

Clyde Hupp Board Room Improvements – The interior remodel work for this project is near completion. Long lead times for critical components of audio/visual (A/V) equipment have pushed final completion of the project to the third quarter of 2023. Until the long-lead communications equipment can be installed, A/V equipment and two flat panel displays have been installed, which will allow for the room to be used for the March 2023 board meeting.

IAQ Improvements at KBTC – An Indoor Air Quality (IAQ) Assessment was on Central Campus' Mohler Building. The study identified multiple factors that would contribute to poor air quality as expressed by staff in the building. Much of the building's HVAC (Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning) system is part of the original construction and, when compared to new technology, is too inefficient to warrant repair. We are currently working with engineers and contractors to define the scope of HVAC replacement. This will include ductwork replacement and ceiling repairs. Finally, the old carpets and tile flooring need remediation and replacement. Due to the timing requirements of the HVAC system upgrades, this project may be divided into two separate projects.

2411 S. 19th Street Building – With ownership secured in April of last year, the college has engaged a vendor to evaluate options for the repair of the building envelope and to prepare a feasibility study for interior modifications to support future instructional activity in the building. A final report is expected by the end of March.




Bates group visits Olympia
