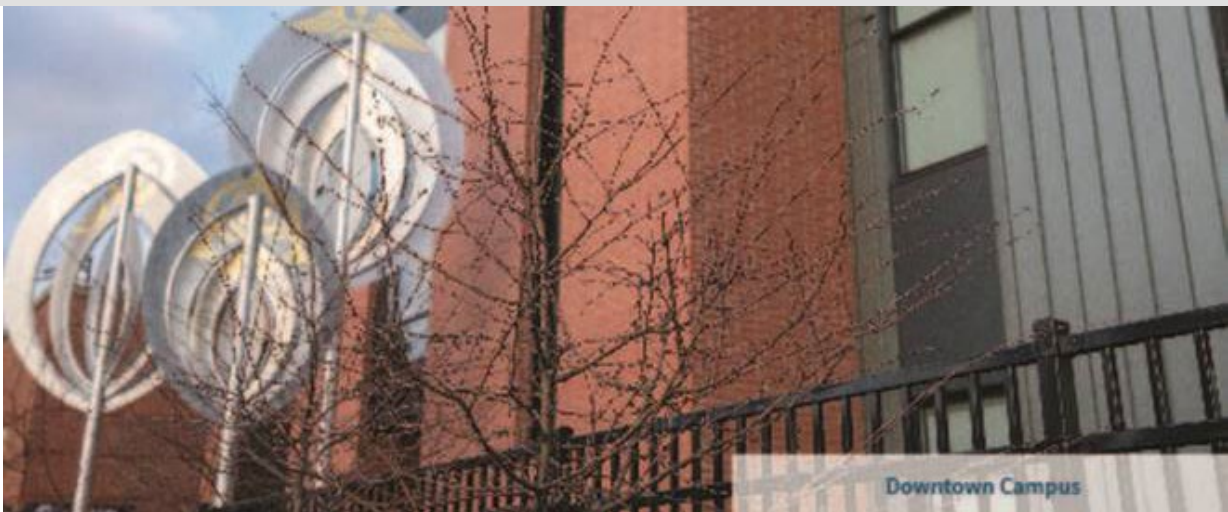

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Department Updates

Instruction

Downtown Campus

During the month of May, students in the Occupational Therapy Assistant program participated in a CarFit event, which is a collaboration between AAA, AARP and the American Occupational Therapy Association. Students were trained as CarFit technicians and hosted a public event at the Panorama Retirement Community, where they helped older drivers achieve the best “fit” in their vehicles.

The Nursing Commission recently approved the newly-updated Practical Nurse program curriculum. The new curriculum will go into effect at the beginning of the Fall Quarter 2023. The nursing program decreased the prerequisites from 45 to 35 and will now be aligned with the DTA. There will be a full-time and part-time option, which will continue to have two starts per year.

Staffing:

We are currently hiring three financial aid staff positions. Two positions are office staff that have moved to other positions in the college. We are also in the process of hiring a new Financial Aid Director. Thank you to Kimberly Uphold for her four years of doing an outstanding job leading this department. She will be missed.

Enrollment and Registration:

ctcLink Process Updates

The Registration Office is now running the Dynamic Date Calculation weekly throughout the Quarter. This is the process that calculates critical dates, like Census Date, for our shorter class sections. Previously, we only ran the process one time at the beginning of a quarter's enrollment start. Dynamic-dated classes, though, continue to be built for our unique programs, like Apprentice and Journeymen classes. This will help to reduce end-of-the quarter reporting errors.

Drop for Non-Payment

Registration continues to improve our Drop for Non-payment process. Our first-time dropping students for non-payment was successfully completed for Spring Quarter. We initiated the process for our second time for Summer Quarter. Registration, Finance, and Financial Aid met earlier in the quarter and developed an improved plan for our Summer Drop efforts.

Fraudulent Admissions

Fraudulent admissions applications are currently a large problem across the country, and it has hit the state of Washington as well. Because we require student advice for all new students it has not had a big impact on us directly. However, there have been indirect impacts.

As of June 1, when any college in our system has identified a possible fraudulent student account, SBCTC syncs that code across our colleges. A new process has been added to our Admission's staff tasks. Admissions is developing a process to address outcomes to the new SBCTC process. We will be issuing tickets to SBCTC for records that have been identified in error as fraudulent. To date, 129 Bates records have been incorrectly coded by identified by other colleges.

Campus Life and Activities:

Outreach:

- Boeing Black Employees Association: Boeing in partnership with Bates developed a DEI outreach event with the mission of cultivating an environment that promotes awareness and inclusion of the Black community through our four pillars: Talent Engagement, Cultural Awareness, Business Alignment and Community Involvement. The event was attended by Bates students, community and faculty.
- Tacoma Housing Authority Career Expo: In partnership with Tacoma Housing Authority, Bates created this important event “Tuesdays at the Bay” to provide employment and education resources to Tacoma housing residents and the community.
- Health Careers Academy: In partnership with Tacoma Public Schools and Health Careers Academy, Bates collaborates to provide and prepare high school students for a wide range of careers in the health industry. High school program is offered at Stadium and Mount Tahoma High Schools. Students are connected to Bates and other colleges to learn about healthcare programs, admissions, scholarships, and more.
- Tacoma Community House: Bates is working in partnership with Tacoma Community House to provide next career steps opportunities for ELA (English Language Acquisition) students. I-BEST is a recognized model to be used with students that provides team-teaching to quickly boost students' literacy while learning job skills or academic subjects. Bates will design a cohort model for admissions and easy steps to enroll for TCH students.
- The Rise Center Adult transition career education: In partnership with Bates, the Rise Center, a non-profit organization, aims to help people restore their lives through short term training after having secured housing. Bates collaborates with the center to provide training resources to underserved community members in Tacoma Hilltop.
